Today's Readings

1 Kings 3.5-12; Romans 8.26-39; Matthew 13.31-33, 44-52

Taking the parables of the kingdom of heaven as a starting point, today's Gospel reading invites us to explore where we find our treasure and what we would be willing to sacrifice to gain that treasure.

In the books of Kings, kings prosper or fail according to how far they 'did what was right' or 'did what was evil' in the sight of the Lord. Solomon's choice highlights discernment between what is right and what is evil as, in the writer's view, the key role of all kings.

In Romans Paul outlines the hope with which he expects the believers to wait for the fulfilment of God's purpose. It is that God will not abandon them, no matter what might befall.

The narrative in Matthew's gospel suggests that the two parables in 31-33 are told to the crowds, while those in 44-50 and the teachings in 51-52 are in private discourse with the disciples. In broad terms, the message to the crowds is about how a small thing like Jesus' movement can become overwhelmingly significant. The message to the disciples is that they have something so valuable it is worth sacrificing everything for it. And, of course, that's precisely what many of Matthew's community have done.
