## Today's Readings Genesis 50.15-21; Romans 14.1-12; Matthew 18.21-35

Forgiveness is the theme of the readings today.

The passage from Genesis comes at the end of a lengthy narrative that recounts the dying Jacob blessing Joseph's sons (Ephraim and Manasseh), and predicting the futures of his twelve sons. The request to Joseph by his brothers for forgiveness comes from fear rather than sorrow, and involves inventing a story about what Jacob might have said. In forgiving his brothers, Joseph places their perfidy in a larger narrative, in which God works all things for a greater good 'to preserve a numerous people'. The theme of this passage seems to be 'forgive offences against you and let God determine the rest'.

The passage from Romans comes from a section about religious diet and abstaining from certain foods, and the issue may be whether Christians should eat meat on sale in the marketplace that may have been sacrificed to pagan gods. Those who were strong in faith, like Paul himself, thought that idols were nothing, and eating food offered to them by pagan priests was inconsequential. However, the 'weak in faith' still had scruples about being contaminated by 'unclean' food. Paul's purpose here is to preserve unity among both sides. The strong must not despise the weak; the abstainers must not judge the more liberal. Everything you do, you must do 'in honour of the Lord': eating, abstaining, celebrating, living, dying. Perhaps the theme of unlimited forgiveness in the passage from Matthew clashes with the treatment of the unrepentant in last week's Gospel. The Greek of esus' answer to Peter could mean 'seventy times seven' or 'seventy-seven times', but as this is about forgiving one person in a single day, the meaning is clear: it must be unlimited. It is possible to reconcile unconditional forgiveness with trying to change people's behaviour.

The parable which follows is about clearing debts, wiping the slate clean — and while it is not an allegory, the king represents God and all who choose to imitate him. It reflects the mutual forgiveness of the Lord's Prayer. Yet the saying at the end is hard, for the 'entire debt' is so high that it could never be cleared. Forgiving others is a threat as well as a privilege.
